YOUR VOTE MATTERS District Committee Election

his month, members in Districts By Tim Holtan, CEO

1, 6, and 7 will receive a list of all the members in their districts who can be nominated to the District

Committee. The members of those districts receiving the highest number of votes shall be the District Committee representative. Please exercise your right as a member of this cooperative and vote for representatives in these districts. Those people elected to the District Committee will be involved in a District Committee meeting, which will take place later in the month of February.

Once elected, delegates will serve a four-year term, provided they continue to reside in their districts and are not absent from two consecutive District Committee meetings. District meetings are scheduled every year, usually mid-tolate February. If you are elected to the district committee, you will receive a notice in the mail letting you know the date, location, and time of the meeting.

The primary purpose of the District Committee Meeting is for members to nominate one or more candidates to run for the co-op's board of directors. While there are no board

of director elections this year, the District Committee is still important. This committee is responsible for establishing rules to govern the conduct of the annual meeting. This may include making recommendations to the annual meeting regarding the Bylaws, Articles of Incorporation, policies of the board, member resolutions, or other matters for the good and welfare of the cooperative. The committee also reviews


the business operations of the cooperative along with the cooperative's finances, and receives updates on the electric industry issues that affect your cooperative.

Any member wishing to present a resolution to the annual meeting shall submit the proposed resolution to the cooperative for consideration at the District Committee meeting. The committee members will consider the resolution and determine whether additional information is needed before determining if it will be presented to the membership at the annual meeting. The deadline for submitting a resolution is February 7, 2024.

The District Committee election is at the very root of what our cooperative is all about. The fact that we as cooperative

members have the right to elect our District Committee representatives and our cooperative directors is what sets us apart from other electric utilities. You have a voice in the operation through the elected representatives.

I encourage you to vote for your District Committee representative if you get a ballot in the mail.



Make a Difference as a Director

As an electric cooperative, Riverland Energy is guided by an elected board of directors who represent their members' best interests when making important decisions. Being a member of the co-op's board is an important position in our community. A director's decision will impact issues, such as service rates, work plans, and budgets. They approve the coop's strategic level plans, budgets, and capital credits.

Our board is a democratically elected body nominated by members of the District Committee and voted into position by any member of the cooperative residing in the board district. Directors represent their members' interests and concerns as they develop policies that guide the cooperative's operation.

Because the directors are members of the cooperatives, they live with their rates and policies. Their decisions are made to carry out the business of the cooperative.

There are no director elections this year, but next year districts 3, 4, and 8 will be up for election. If you're interested in serving as a director, or being a representative at our District Committee, contact our office. We'll guide you through the process and answer any questions regarding qualifications or responsibilities as a director.

BILLING STATEMENTS INCLUDE A MONTHLY DEMAND LINE ITEM

You may notice a line item on your electric bill called "demand charge." Demand charge, currently a zero charge, is based on each member's maximum "demand" put on the cooperative's distribution system. The amount of electricity you consume in a month is measured in kilowatt hours (kWh), while "demand" is measured in kilowatts (kW). The max demand is the highest energy used in a 15-minute period over a month. It is monitored every 15 minutes, and billed on a monthly basis. That means the 15-minute interval during which your business or residence is consuming (or "demanding") the most electricity, in a given month, establishes your demand for the month. The demand charge line item will have a date and time stamp of when it occurred for your service, with a zero charge.

This structure aligns with how the co-op is charged from its wholesale provider, Dairyland Power Cooperative.

Demand is a key component in Riverland's wholesale power costs. The ability for the membership to recognize what demand is and how it can be reduced will help Riverland control wholesale power costs. It is important to understand that demand isn't necessarily about how much energy you use, but how and when you use it over the course of a month. For instance, a typical residence can control demand by turning off the air conditioner while doing laundry. By not allowing the A/C to run at the same time as the electric water heater and/or electric dryer, you are reducing your demand.



PRE-PAY OPTION COMING JAN. 29

Pre-pay is a new optional billing program that lets members pre-pay for their electricity. Instead of receiving a bill at the end of the month for power you have already used, you have the flexibility of purchasing electricity when you want. Pay amounts that fit your budget!

New EV Charge-N-Save Rate Set

The new EV Charge-N-Save Time-of-Use (TOU) Rate is a voluntary

residential electric rate that helps reduce demand for electricity during peak times of the day. It encourages EV drivers to charge their vehicles when electricity costs less. This reduction in peak energy helps keep the overall cost of electricity down for the entire co-op.

EV Charge N Save Rate

You are not required to sign up for the new rates; it is simply a new billing option available to members interested in reducing energy costs by charging their EV during off-peak times.

MONTHLY BASE SERVICE ELECTRIC CHARGE

Many of you may have wondered why the base service charge is a different amount each month. The current base electric charge is \$1.26 per day and covers each member's share of the cost for construction and maintenance of poles, wires, transformers, meters, right-of-way clearing, and other fixed expenses that enable you to access electric service at your location. This is a daily charge, so it may be different total each month, depending on how many days are in the month.

Cost regardless of usage

It costs the same to build and maintain the system, regardless of how much energy you use. Fixed costs are spread among all members, meaning the base charge is—and should be—the same for all members, regardless of energy use.

Fewer members in rural areas to share costs

Fixed costs to build and maintain the system are shared equally among all co-op members. REC has just five members per mile of line to share fixed costs, while urban utilities spread costs among 20 or more consumers per mile. The basic charge is higher in rural areas because costs are shared by fewer members.

Rates are based on a cost-of-service study Riverland Energy has done every few years.

- Applicants must be graduating seniors whose parents or legal guardians are members of Riverland Energy Cooperative.
- Students attending public, private, parochial, or home school are eligible to apply.
- Scholarships are selected in a random drawing at our annual meeting on March 23.
- The student or their parent/guardian must be present at the annual meeting in order to qualify.
 The 2024 deadline to apply is March 15.



2024 REBATE PROGRAM

embers wanting to save energy and money in the new year should review Riverland Energy's 2024 rebate forms. Riverland Energy annually publishes a list of energy efficient items that are eligible for a rebate when a member makes a qualifying purchase and submits the required paperwork.

Eligibility criteria for each category is listed on the forms. To receive a rebate, the member must purchase a qualifying item, fill out the rebate form, and return the form and documentation to the cooperative within three months of purchase or installation (this will be clarified on the form). Equipment must be installed within the cooperative's service territory and, in most cases, must be ENERGY STAR® rated. Rebate forms can be found at one of our offices or online at riverlandenergy.com.
